President's Report, Dave McIver

I hope your hunting season has started as well as mine. After four years of applying we were finally drawn for Moose in our favourite WMU. Our season lasted twenty minutes. Before we were even to our chosen spot a cow, calf and bull ran across the trail in front of us. We stopped and listened to them

both serenade us with rutting calls while we hastily got our gear together. While we were trying to decide on the best approach to get near them as they continued calling, the cow and calf came out of the trees in front of us and ran off to the East. A minute later out came the bull and stopped to smell her tracks at 175 yards. Moose season finished. After depositing the moose at home we decided to go back and spend the night camping, as we had originally planned, so we could enjoy the area we had not seen for four years. I was there when my 14-year-old granddaughter shot her first deer with one shot at 200 yards. Hunting does not get much better than that. However, my year was just beginning.

I went antelope hunting for the first time in 15 years. We saw 30-40 bucks, some very good ones, and many does. The highlight of the trip was standing outside the truck with my rifle, while two bucks came tearing across the field right towards us. Fifty yards behind the vehicle the bigger buck decided that he had chased the challenger far enough and stopped on the road, pawed the ground and snorted. He then went over to a thick weed patch and began working it over with his horns. He hooked and pulled so hard that he was lifting his rear end right off the ground. Not once did he give us, or the vehicle, as much as a look. He then trotted back to his does.

Upland bird hunting has also been good. I saw lots of sharp-tail grouse, several coveys of 12 to 15, and one covey of 32. As usual, I greatly increased the profits of the ammunition companies while shooting at Huns, but I did get a few. I watched four wild pheasants strut across a field together, and it reminded me of hunting south of Lethbridge in the '60's. The dog was able to put seven wild roosters out of a single fence line less than a quarter mile long.

All this and November has not even arrived yet. I'm wondering if I have not died and gone to heaven.

Sarcee Update from AFGA, Yves Ouellette

- 2004-05 Dream Hunt Raffle Tickets available to purchase and sign out to sell. I encourage individuals to get involved in this big fundraiser for the Wildlife Trust Fund (WTF). Call Yves or AFGA office for Tickets.
- Hide Collection Program – I encourage individuals to get the word out to other hunters about this great program and donate their hides. I encourage members to start up new depots in communities where drop off points aren't available. There are a number of depots in the Calgary area.
- WTF update – The Murdoch Property (quarter section) adjoining the Buffalo Lake Conservation Area has been secured because of the contributions from six Fish & Game clubs. Special thanks go out to Camrose, Millet, Red Deer, Provost, Sarcee and Sherwood Park Fish & Game Clubs.
 - The Peigan Creek Property is located south of Seven Persons in southeastern Alberta and consists of a full section of primarily native prairie. AFGA has just received enough funds to complete this acquisition. This will be the largest acquisition AFGA has been involved with in southern Alberta and the most expensive acquisition the WTF has been a part of.
 - The WTF is currently working on a number of other potential acquisitions across the province. Any referrals clubs have can be passed on to Yves.
- The Placemat Program is still going on. This program involves providing paper placemats with AFGA advertising on it to businesses that are interested. There is no cost to clubs or individuals. Anyone interested in handing out placemats to local café's and restaurants can contact the AFGA head office and they will mail them out to you at no cost.
- Block Fund Program (funded by the ACA). There is money available to clubs doing habitat enhancement projects in their area. Contact Yves Ouellette for more details. This fund will not be available next year. Clubs planning projects next year are asked to apply for individual grants through the ACA. Yves Ouellette can assist you with the application.
- The Habitat Steward and Heritage Farmstead Programs are still available to clubs to recognize habitat stewards in their community. No cost to the club or landowner with this program. Contact Yves for details.
- Conservation Tree Program deadline for orders is coming up in December. All clubs and landowners interested in planting trees next spring can contact Yves for application forms or info about this program.

The categories and rules of the 2004 contest are as follows:

- **Alberta Wildlife** - Wildlife taken in Alberta
- **Alberta Scenery** - Scenic/landscape taken in Alberta
- **Alberta Nature (club)** - flora, fauna, insects any nature related subject, taken in Alberta
- **Alberta Open (club)** - anything outdoors related, camping hiking, picnic event, etc.
- **Best at a club function (club)** - pig roast, fish derby, annual banquet, etc.
- **Out of Province (club)** - Your vacation out of Alberta fishing trip, polar bears, etc.

Please note that only Alberta Wildlife and Alberta Scenery are AFGA categories, the other 4 are Sarcee Fish and Game Categories.

The rules of the Sarcee Fish and Game photo contest are as follows:

- 1 Open to all amateur photographers that are members of Sarcee Fish and Game Assoc.
2. All entries must have been taken in Alberta, with the exception of the Out of province category.
3. Mediums can be black and white or colour
4. Size. No smaller than 4X6, all unframed
5. Judging will be done by professional photographers
6. Alberta Wildlife and Alberta Scenery 1st, 2nd and 3rd will be enlarged to 8 X 10 and entered into the AFGA contest
7. The photos will be displayed at club functions
- 8 All photos should be identified - name, phone number, where taken and the category would be nice also. Note use pencil (editor note there are special all surface pencils that will not damage the photo, as regular lead pencil will damage photo over time) or sticker tabs so not to damage the photo.
9. No previously winning entries can be submitted.
- 10 PLEASE NOTE Any Sarcee members that have a photo that they think is good enough to go to the AFGA Photo Contest, can enter the photo. This is for people that missed the Sarcee Contest or people that would like another judge's opinion of their photo. Last Year (2003)

There are reports of "10's of thousand of snow geese" just east of Brooks, and 1,000's of other geese and ducks too. Get out there before they leave.

There are thousands of Canada geese and Mallard ducks North, East and within the City of Calgary.

The Gray Partridge and Sharp-tailed Grouse are very plentiful with large bunches reported.

All the Yearly Sarcee Fish and Game Trophies for longest pheasant and heaviest Canada Goose, Mallard Duck, White-fronted Goose and Snow Goose are up for grabs. I have extra entry forms. Please get them weighted at government-inspected scales that print out the "Weight Slip" Entry Deadline is Jan 2005 at the Trophy Measuring Night.

Grizzly bear encounters prompt closure of South Ghost area

Hunters and recreationalists urged to plan ahead to avoid the area

*Edmonton...*In the interests of public safety, an area near the South Ghost Provincial Forest Recreation Area has been closed to the public because of the presence of aggressive grizzly bears, some accompanied by cubs.

The South Ghost area is located 45 minutes north and west of Cochrane, about an hour's drive from Calgary. It is southeast of the Waiparous Creek Provincial Forest Recreation Area.

The area closed by Fish and Wildlife officers includes a 25,467-hectare area in wildlife management unit 412. The closure will be in effect until bear activity has ceased in the area. Bears usually hibernate by the end of November.

Some of the reported incidents involve a grizzly bear accompanied by cubs, which demonstrated unusually aggressive behavior toward people on separate occasions in the area recently. There have been reports this month of a bear charging someone on an all-terrain vehicle and twice charging two other vehicles. Fish and Wildlife officers previously put up warning signs, but following increased bear activity, a decision has been made to close the entire area.

Hunters and recreationalists are reminded that bears in Alberta are still very actively searching for food to fatten up for the winter. Some of the aggressive bear incidents in the South Ghost area involved bears chasing humans away from food sources such as animal carcasses.

Nice to know

Trees produce oxygen. One acre of trees can produce enough oxygen for 18 people everyday.

Trees remove carbon dioxide from the air. A healthy tree can store about 13 pound of carbon per year, or about 2.6 tons per acre of trees.

Increasing the heat retaining efficiency of your house by 1 % reduces carbon dioxide emissions by .31 tons per year. 5%=1.55 tons per year.
